### Highlights from the CFAR Luncheon in Calgary with David Paul

CFAR held another successful luncheon on Feb 19th at the Delta Inn South in Calgary with approximately 80 members and guests attending. Members were honoured by having Chief Reg Crowshoe, a well-respected Piikani-Blackfoot Elder, provide the opening prayer.

In addition we had a special recognition moment for Rob Barber, the past President of CFAR, who received a drum and honour song performed by Chief Crowshoe. Rob has been a significant source of energy in making CFAR the success it is to date.

Although our keynote speaker, Chief Commissioner Manny Jules, became ill and had to decline at the last moment, Mr. David Paul, the Deputy Commissioner of the First Nations Tax Commission flew in from New Brunswick and did an excellent job of substituting for him.

The key message in Mr. Paul's presentation was about economic certainty. Developing a property tax system on FN lands provides a significant benefit to the community because it allows them to unlock the revenue generating potential of the land. It does this by providing investors with certainty regarding the tax regime for any investments they wish to make and it provides the community with the ability to use the land value to access any needed financing for infrastructure development requirements.

As Mr. Paul was trying to arrange for a return home flight, the audience unfortunately didn't have time to ask questions, so he has volunteered his e-mail address dpaul@fntc.ca as a number of participants had follow-up questions. In addition the Tax Commission has an excellent web-site at www.fntc.ca to review what has been developed over the last 18 years in the area of taxation on Reserve lands.

#### **CFAR and the Edmonton Aboriginal Education Council**

On March 11, CFAR board members Rob Barber and Gerry Laslo made a presentation of the CFAR Society to a group of Aboriginal post-secondary students and other interested individuals at the NAIT student lounge atop the business centre tower. A good cross section of students showed up, 30 in total, from British Columbia, Nunavut, the Territories, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba and New Brunswick who attend such local Edmonton schools as NAIT, Concordia, NorQuest, and Yellowhead Tribal College. Pizza and pop was on the menu and everyone decided to position themselves in a circle before starting.

Rob began by welcoming all to the event, distributed handouts explaining the history of CFAR and the direction which the board of directors and members have planned for the Society. Gerry added that he has been involved with First Nation administrations in a variety of capacities for over 30 years and has been associated mostly with the Sunchild First Nation which made joining the CFAR board a natural fit with his duties as the liaison worker.

An overview of the reasoning for developing an accreditation program for Aboriginal liaison personnel for both communities and industry was explained, as was the process in place to achieve this. The other responsibilities of CFAR were also outlined, followed by a 'Q & A' period for the students. The questions were all very good and well thought out and Rob and Gerry answered them as best they could. If the students required more information, they were directed to their handout package which included accessing the CFAR website and contact information.

The event was originally scheduled for 4 - 6 p.m., however due to interest it actually went from 3:45 - 7:15 p.m. One participant from the Territories told the group that he was glad that he came because he was in Edmonton changing his career from that of a carpenter to one involved in the humanities. He said that as companies look to the north as the next major development area for natural resources, these liaison positions will be in demand and that he was very interested to get involved as soon as possible.

Overall, it was a great evening enjoyed not only by the students, but by the presenters as well. They wished the best for all of the students who attended and applaud them for continuing on with their education and career selection, whatever that may be. CFAR has added another career option for post-secondary Aboriginal students to consider.


Fernande will be stick-handling her way through the books of the CFAR Society and working alongside Christine to ensure our members continue to receive timely information about our many activities.
